Reports from a Patrol by a Street Pastor:

- We passed a man in his thirties, smart but with no coat. We stopped to chat and then he said: 'I buried my best friend today', clearly grief-stricken and slightly drunk. We asked him about this and offered him help. We called back to the prayer team to say a prayer for him and his grief.
- We met a young couple who had been helped by SP in Cheltenham, gave out lollies and chatted about our work. They asked one of the

three questions we often get asked: 1. Are you paid? 2. Are you afraid? 3. Isn't it a bit late for you to be out?

- Later we chatted to Elaine, the manager of the Angel Vaults, the manager of the Blue Lagoon Bangladeshi restaurant in Waterside, Carmen at Marilyn's and Donna at the Ambassador Club in Avon Street who made us coffees

- Sometimes it is just being asked to walk with a young woman to a cashpoint and back to a pub; sometimes it is to challenge us on a point of theology; mostly it is about listening, caring, helping with the odd lollipop!

- And this is mostly about mission and ministry in reverse. God in the form of Jesus is already in these places and we as Street Pastors respond; we have all developed as a result and we could cite many personal testimonies of this, many undergoing training and further education in theology and pastoral care. *Chris Sheehan – Patrol Leader*

When you lose someone close to you there are regrets: the things you failed to say, or listening, failed to fully comprehend. Street Pastoring is a lot about listening. Encounters with those

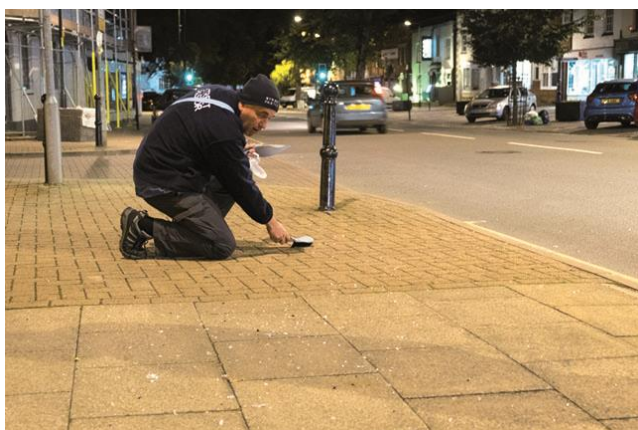

It can't be easy to find the right words and show the right sensitivity and it is a huge responsibility. If God is living in us and we are his hands and feet and sometimes his voice – that is truly awesome and also demanding.

In his recently published book, *A Luta Continua*, David Haslam refers to Jesus at prayer reflecting, searching, struggling to discover how he should be, what he should say and do. 'The Gospel', David writes 'is deeply radical about human values, human behaviour and what human

beings are making of the world. It goes to the roots of what we should be, loving our neighbours... and both praying and fighting for the structures which will encourage us all to live up to our high calling as children of a God who loves peace-with-justice.'
